It goes without saying that we are in an extremely exciting time in the history of the Old Muirite Union and indeed our alma mater. As many individuals have shared with me – its not every day that a school turns 200 years old. We as old boys and members of the Old Muirite Union have a vested interest in the 200- year celebrations, having attended Muir College or having invested much energy in Muir College.

The Siya 'Ekhaya (Coming Home) campaign has led to many old boys from around the world contacting the Old Muirite Union and confirming their attendance at Founders' Week in August. It is certainly the intention of the OMU Committee to include and provide an opportunity for every old boy to participate in Founders' Week activities – and to this extent our

online booking system opened early in February – to allow old boys to book multiple times over a 5-month period. There have been bookings for all of the activities as well as memorabilia, so we are positive we are on the right track. The most popular activities to date have been the Muir College 200 Year Gala Dinner (to date 74 of the 91 tables have been booked) and the OMU 200-year Golf Day (27 of the 50 available four-balls have been booked).

In conversation with ... Neil Crawford

Muir Headmaster 1997 – 2001 Founder member of the Muir Foundation since 2021



Neil Crawford bears the distinction of having taught at four of South Africa's great schools, and is the only person ever to have been principal of the only two remaining boys' high schools in the greater Nelson Mandela Bay area – Muir and Grey.

In looking back on his early life, he recalls that he was 'privileged and blessed to have had supportive and encouraging parents who instilled a sense of purpose in me to always set my sights high'. Throughout his primary and secondary education, Neil was 'totally involved in school activities and privileged to receive a well-balanced, all-round education – in mind, body and spirit.' As a pupil, he took part in various cultural events, including debating, and he participated in several sports, including athletics, cross-country and rugby.

Neil was educated at Fish Hoek Junior and High Schools, then at the Graaff-Reinet and Paarl teachers' training colleges. He then moved on to Rhodes University where he majored in Geography and Human Movement Studies (Phys Ed), and coached rugby.

He recalls that when, as Head Prefect in his matric year, he delivered the 1970 valedictory address to the staff, pupils and parents of his school, he had not yet firmly decided upon a career. His final decision was made while he was undergoing his military service and, fortunately for future generations, he chose teaching – 'and never looked back!'

'Making a positive difference in people's lives, both in the classroom and extramurally, became a passion of mine,' he says, adding that he savoured every moment of his 42 years in education, and never considered an alternative career.

Neil's first teaching post was at Wynberg Boys' High (a school almost as old as Muir!) where from January 1976 he taught Mathematics and Physical Education, coached rugby, headed up aquatics, and was a hostel duty master. In 1984 he accepted the position of Vice-Principal at Queen's College, and from 1985 was the First XV Rugby coach. He later became Deputy Headmaster and, in addition to his teaching and a wide range of administrative and other duties, was in charge of the prefects and the school's leadership training programmes.

Having been well prepared to take on higher office, in 1997 Neil was appointed Headmaster of Muir College. Sadly for 'The Muir', in mid-2001 he was poached by 'The Grey' where he served as Rector until his retirement at the end of 2017.

Neil has always been a great believer in 'leadership by walkabout'. Consequently, during his teaching career he was always an avid supporter of all academic, sporting and cultural activities. 'As Headmaster of any school, one faces many challenges, curved balls and, at times, the unexpected – and so the importance of positivity and infectious enthusiasm, coupled with a sense of humour. I always endeavoured to surround myself with good, loyal and capable people and colleagues, and kicked the odd toxic individual into touch!'

Crawford often found that the Department of Education was a cause for concern and frustration, mainly in the allocation of teaching staff, yet he somehow always maintained a cordial working relationship with departmental officials.

At Muir in particular, he was 'blessed to be associated with a wonderfully supportive and loyal staff, parent body and old boy network – and, of course, the "Second to None" Muirites.'

Amongst many associated with Muir, Neil pays tribute to several individuals, including his deputy, Bun Hopley who, he says, could not have been a better right-hand man – 'a real champion!' He also praises Carl Lategan and Fenner Barnard who 'so passionately looked after the interests and well-being of the junior section of the College.' He understandably singles out the commitment of Tom Ferreira and Godfrey Streso, while amongst others whom he found very supportive were former Head, Paul Ellis, and the Headmaster's Secretary, Mrs Baby Ferreira who was 'hugely efficient'. He recalls that it was a pleasure working with Ian Krain, at that time National President of the Old Muirite Union, and the OMU committee, and he expresses gratitude to Ivan Beaumont, chairperson of the School Governing Body at the time of his appointment.

Asked of the disciplinary challenges that he encountered at Muir, he responds that all schools face disciplinary issues at times, and this was no different at Muir. He believes that most of these were well handled and controlled by the staff, and Muirites were especially wary not to challenge or put Dave Francis to the test – they would have done so at their own peril!


On reflection, Neil feels that he was privileged and honoured to have served 'The Family of Muir' during his period as Headmaster.

In his retirement Neil soon became involved in various organisations, including Rotary, the councils and foundations of schools, and the body corporate of a housing complex. He has enjoyed some travelling, and became a competitive marathon and long distance runner for a while, but these days he walks on a daily basis for that essential exercise!

Neil particularly wishes the College Headmaster, Robin Stephenson, success – together with the staff, Chairperson of the SGB Peter Else, and President of the OMU Andrew Binning, together with his team – in their efforts to make 2022 a 'milestone year', one to remember, savour and treasure: '200 strong!'

THIRTY-TWO YEARS OF GOING IT ALONE: 1962-1994

DID YOU KNOW?

Muir College Boys' Primary School, previously part of the greater Muir College, became a separate school in January 1962. How did this come about?


Owing to continual increases in pupil numbers, it was thought that Muir College was becoming too big to be managed with optimal efficiency, and that the Primary section deserved to have its own needs and interests looked after independently. Muir Primary comprised only Std-2 to Std-5 (Grades 4-7), however, as the new co-educational College Hill Preparatory School was to cater for Sub-A to Std 1 (Grades 1-3).




Chapters 16 to 19 of the Muir 1822-2022 book, Shout till the Rafters Ring, tell the story of Muir College Boys' Primary under what were effectively five headmasters, namely Noel Jennings, Willie Watson (acting for a full year), Ronnie van Niekerk, Lex Vincent and Carl Lategan. These chapters relate the chronic difficulties brought about by inadequate accommodation, what was done about it at times and the school's eventual decision to move to a completely new site in town. There was a twist in the new site 'tale', however, culminating in unexpectedly rapid developments in 1987.

But the story of Muir Primary is so much more: from the staging of musical shows, gym displays

and floodlit rugby festivals to pupils ascending great heights in the sporting arena. In some sports, especially rugby, the results were often nothing short of spectacular. Many an opponent was left in the 'wake' of Muir swimmers in inter-schools galas, while there was good reason to claim, over a few seasons, that Muir College Boys' Primary provided the top diving teams in the country.







By the early 1990s much had changed in the political landscape of South Africa; this had a negative effect on enrolments, while other factors also led to Muir Primary's agreeing to be reunited with 'Big Brother' in Vanes Estate

THE BELL

Clive Shamley, class of 1964, recently shared the story of how the Muir College Bell came about:

During the 1960's or earlier, Muir College had a shooting team that Clive was part of. Mr Clement, the Headmaster at the time, was their coach and shooting practice took place in what was knows as "The butts" behind the old N.C. Dugmore hostel.

The scholars used point. 22 single-shot rifles and after practice they had to pick up the spent cartridges and hand to one of their teachers, Mr David Owen. Mr Owen kept the cartridges, and no one dared ask what he did with them.

When Muir College moved to the current premises, Mr Owen still had the cartridges and had them melted down and the bell was cast and donated to the school. Can you imagine how many cartridges it took to make that bell?

Thanks Mr Owen for creating such a wonderful story and piece of history for Muir College.

TREVOR WINER (Class of 1955)



Trevor Winer attended Muir College and matriculated in 1955, whereafter he had extensive experience in the IT industry, becoming the founder and CEO of a major software company called SPL World Group Holdings.

In 2008 the Winer family set up an annual scholarship to financially assist Muirites with their studies at a university of their choice for 4 years. During this time, 18 Muirites have been the recipients of this award.

Our heartfelt thanks go to the Winer family for assisting, mentoring, and impacting the lives of so many Muirites.


This book has been 5 years in the making, with Old Muirite, Charles van Renen (Class of 1963), the author of the book, along with his



LONWABO MARELE (Class of 2012)



Percy Temane, an author in Johannesburg, nominated Old Muirite Lonwabo Marele to give a Tedx Talk. Marele had to pitch his idea in 5 minutes to a panel and was then given two and a half months to prepare his speech, spending 30 minutes to an hour every day on preparations.

His speech, titled "Generational Wealth Creation in the Townships is simpler than we realise", was performed in front of an audience of about 70 people at the Workshop17, in the V&A Waterfront, Cape Town, in November 2021, with approximately 500 people joining online. The topic speaks about how a simple shift of the mindset can help us realise that we have all the resources we need to succeed, no matter the area or circumstance. He made an example of a stokvel that his mother, Buyelwa Marele, joined when he was still very young. She earned R2,500 a month at work and by joining a stokvel, she was able to put Lonwabo into Muir College Boys' High School.

Lonwabo Marele is a multimedia entrepreneur, journalist, philanthropist, and Master of Laws candidate at Unicaf. He writes sports for 15 cape community newspapers and is the founder and CEO of a digital wealth magazine and a global media production company - Successful Journals. He is also the co-founder of The Fruit Store Podcast, SSL Printing & Consulting, and the vice-chairman at Ngcayisa & Marele Foundation (NPO).






WHERE ARE THEY NOW - MEET THE OLD MUIRITE

DAVID FROST – CLASS OF 1962

David's career started in 1963 with the Department of Posts and Telecomms as a pupil technician and later as a technician in Port Elizabeth, Uitenhage and Pretoria. In 1975 he returned to Port Elizabeth from Pretoria and obtained a post with the Municipality as Engineer in the distribution division. From there David moved to East London to join Zakrewski Ass. Inc as a consulting Engineer and was given a directorship. In 1987 he



co-founded Adams & Frost Consulting Engineers in East London. They amalgamated with Gardner and Carpenter in 1990 and renamed the holding company Carifro Consulting Engineers. At the same time a second office was also opened in Port Elizabeth, which David managed until he retired in 2014, and now lives in Cape Town.

David is married to Carryl and has 2 sons and a daughter, and a total of 5 grandchildren. Since moving to Cape Town they have been in either full or semi lock down but, when possible, they explore Cape Town and surrounds and spend time with family. They've also enjoyed some international travel during retirement and Dave has taken up Golf Croquet and spends 2 afternoons a week on the greens.

Frost prefers non-fiction books and is reading technical journals relating to renewable energy and energy storage. His music of choice is music from the 50s and 60s.

David is proud of Muir College especially when triumphing over other schools in rugby and cricket.

Frost's parting words: Always go the extra mile and try to enjoy the work you do and if you don't, make a change. Life's too short to waste on activities you don't enjoy.




The Instagram page (Old Muirite Union) has grown from just under 200 followers in March 2021 to over 700 in March 2022 and continues to grow.
