A Headmaster retires ...



Robin Raymond Stephenson is a graduate of the University of Port Elizabeth (nowadays NMU) where he majored in History and Linguistics. After obtaining his Higher Diploma in Education, he taught at Daniel Pienaar, Cathcart High and Graeme College before his appointment as headmaster of Muir College in 2016.

After nearly seven years at the helm of Muir College, Robin Stephenson has decided to retire at the end of 2022.

In a recent engagement with Rob Sharman of the OMU, Robin freely reminisced about his career and developments at Muir since his arrival, as well as the school's future challenges.

Asked why he chose to accept the appointment as the 20th headmaster of Muir, he responded, "It seemed a logical post for me. I was a Deputy Headmaster at Graeme, running the Academic programme. Muir is a similar school and I saw it as a challenge that I would like to tackle, especially with the Bicentenary on the horizon."

"When I arrived at Muir at the beginning of May 2016, there were no surprises. The school was well run and the boys were proud of the school – and that is always a good sign."

Robin is justifiably proud of Muir's efforts to strengthen its academic focus. "Over the years, we made some important changes to the curriculum. One of them was the introduction of isiXhosa First Additional Language in the Primary Phase. I'm very happy that we made that decision. The introduction of Coding and Robotics in Grade 8 this year has also been a step in the right direction, as has been the introduction of academic achievement badges."

The introduction of the school's Arts and Culture Week, the extension of debating to the GET phase and the launching of the school's marimba band three years ago are some of the cultural highlights of Robin's tenure at Muir, and he hopes that a junior choir will soon be added to the school's many extramural offerings.

"On the sporting front, shortly after my arrival I noticed that the conditioning of our rugby players was a problem.

The appointment of a full-time conditioning coach and gym manager has made a huge difference.

"Cricket has also received a huge boost with Muir being chosen by Cricket South Africa as a Focus School, after which CSA appointed a professional coach for the school. This partnership is still intact, although bursaries for players have unfortunately been terminated by CSA."

A disappointment for Robin has, however, been the school's lack of development on the hockey field. "It has become almost impossible to compete with teams that have Astroturf facilities. This is not an easy problem to solve."

Regarding overall spirit and discipline, Robin points out that Muir College is a school where the learners are generally content. "Respect is shown to one another and I am extremely proud of this. Hopefully I have made a contribution in this regard."

Throughout his time at Muir, Robin says, he has been able to count not only on the support of many excellent members of staff, but also on the strong support of the School Governing Body - first under Frank McFarlane and then Peter Else. He is also very grateful for the support of Jason Henman and the OMU in his early years as Head.

Within a few years of Robin's arrival at Muir, "with the Bicentenary approaching, the OMU grew stronger and we started planning for the big year, but we were not counting on the arrival of Covid-19. The next couple of years were really tough. I must confess that Covid-related pressures took their toll on me and made it difficult to plan for 2022.

"The 2022 Bicentenary Committee consisted of members of the SGB, staff and the OMU. Numerous events were well planned and successfully completed. The evening with the Drakensberg Choir was special, as was the launch of the Charles van Renen's excellent commemorative book, *Shout till the Rafters Ring*, which had been a massive undertaking.

"Then came the 2022 Founder's Week. I must salute Andrew Binning and his team. Their attention to detail was superb. The memories will remain with us always! Importantly, the profile of the school has been raised and the Muir family has been united - two of our objectives when we started planning for 2022.

"The Muir Campus has always been special to me. I have made it my business to make additions where possible. Examples are the benches overlooking the Ellis Field, the new electronic scoreboard, the re-design of the Memorial Garden and pond, as well as new signage. Many of these projects were sponsored by Old Boys or parents. My wife Penny has played a huge part in assisting me. I believe that a beautiful, well-kept campus is essential for our boys and indeed our community. Hopefully our borehole, which has eventually been fixed, will assist us in future, as will the water tanks donated via the OMU.

"Somehow, we managed to complete the new tuck shop, which has made a huge difference to the atmosphere at the school. The old tuck shop was transformed into a modern Resource Centre that was opened in 2022 and was named in honour of Trevor Winer, a distinguished old boy of the school. This has enabled us to convert the old library into an Archives Room, which is an important addition to our school – especially one with such a proud history. "A huge step forward has been the establishment of the Muir Foundation, as well as the school's solar energy initiative which, I am sure, will be of enduring benefit to the school.

Understandably, not all has gone according to plan. "I was very excited when the DoE promised us a new fence, but unfortunately this never materialized. This will have to be addressed, as well as the gravel road in front of the school, which needs to be tarred."

For most of the school's 200-year history the boarders were the backbone of the school, but declining numbers and rising costs led to the introduction of weekly boarding in 2003, and an inevitable decline in the fortunes of Thomas Muir House. Robin has attempted to re-introduce full-time boarding, which is seen as an essential element in the success of the more prominent boys' schools in South Africa, but he has not been able to generate enough interest, and the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic has not helped. "Perhaps," he says, "as we get more bursaries, we will be able to address the hostel issue."

'Realignment' is an idea that has recently been on the agenda of the Department of Education, which has suggested splitting the school into two separate institutions once again. Robin contends that this is not feasible, especially as College Hill Prep has recently announced its decision to become a full primary school, which will not only change its special relationship with the College, but will probably reduce primary numbers at Muir. "This has been a sad announcement, especially in our 200th year."

In spite of his concerns and the looming threats, there is no doubt that Robin leaves the school stronger than it was when he arrived.

Muir College has indeed been fortunate to have had an extraordinary man at the helm during a crucial period in the school's history. It will take another extraordinary man to fill his shoes and to build on the momentum gained during Robin Stephenson's momentous tenure at 'The Muir.'

His legacy will undoubtedly be the vision he has had for Muir as demonstrated in the many new additions to the school. The blue heritage plaque in the Memorial Quad epitomises his heart and his passion for everything.

He has left an indelible mark on our school.



Arthur Oliver, from the Class of 1966, who currently lives in Jeffreys Bay, has sacrificed a lot, worked hard and achieved academically, but his start was a bit rocky.

In his matric year, when Arthur was majoring in Rugby, the Headmaster at the time, Cecil Clement, commented on his report "June: Arthur's maths needs serious attention." And in September "Arthur's maths is atrocious."

The hole and foundation were laid and ensured that the flagpole's position was in the foreground of the Southender.




